While things may have had to shift a bit, we were so thankful to be able to realize this goal and to do so without sacrificing the quality of education. It took a village.

Appreciating where we have been, maneuvering through the still uncharted waters of the ever-changing world around us, and maintaining focus on the future and continued growth of Friends School Mullica Hill, we will rely on that strong foundation to carry us forward; driven by our values; and nourished by the generosity of our school community. THE FSMH DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSIVITY COMMITTEE

At the beginning of 2018-19 school year, Friends School Mullica Hill announced the creation of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity Committee and invited all interested members of the FSMH community to join. The committee was formed following the strategic visioning process in which Diversity was one of the first and most frequently named values of the school community and identified as both a strength and an opportunity for growth.

Under the direction of its clerk, Dr.
Monika Williams Shealey, the Committee
has worked to define its mission and to
reach consensus on language defining
diversity, equity, and inclusivity.

Committee Mission: To raise awareness and discuss issues related to diversity, equity and inclusion, work collaboratively with staff to enrich the educational experience of students, foster appreciation and respect for diversity, and advocate for the inclusion of those with diverse backgrounds and experiences.

Diversity is expressed in various forms, including race and ethnicity, gender and gender identity, sexual orientation,

socioeconomic status, language, culture, marital status, national origin, religion, age, (dis)ability status and political perspective.

Equity is the guarantee of fair treatment, access, opportunity, and advancement for all students, families and staff, while identifying and eliminating barriers that prevent full participation of some groups.

Inclusivity is active, intentional, and ongoing engagement with diversity.

School Climate Survey and Focus Group

During the 2018-19 school year, the committee developed a "School Climate Survey" and disseminated it to students in grades 4 to 8 as well as to staff and parents. The Likert-scale

survey included a comments section for each question and an invitation to participate in a focus group session if deemed necessary. Four students offered to participate in focus groups which were facilitated by Teachers Peter and Sophie. The survey results were shared with T. Matt and the Board of Trustees. The committee reviewed data to identify common themes and made recommendations based on the information collected in the survey and focus groups.

Looking Ahead

With the 2020-21 school year underway, the DEI Committee is continuing to do its work. The committee welcomes all voices and new families. "The group is open to the entire Friends community," clerk Monika Williams Shealey said.

"We strive to support the school's mission by deepening our understanding of issues of diversity, equity, and inclusivity and by providing programming that enhances the experiences of students, faculty, and staff."

























In the 1960s and early 1970s, Woodbury Friends School (and then Friends School Mullica Hill) regularly participated in the National Spelling Bee. The first stage was a spelling bee within the school, which was organized for many years by Hanshi Deshbandhu, a sixth grade teacher at the time. The winner or winners of the school contest advanced to another event in Gloucester County, which was hosted most years by the Mullica Hill Grange. The winner of this spelling bee advanced to a regional competition of students in the greater Philadelphia area hosted by the Philadelphia Bulletin, a long-running but now defunct daily newspaper. The winner of this contest advanced to the National Finals in Washington, D.C.

The first Friends School student to advance to the National Final was Alexander Knisely who won the Greater Philadelphia regional in the Fall of 1968 and came in 17th in Washington, D.C. the following year. Alexander's younger brother, Jonathan, won the local competition at the Mullica Hill Grange three years in a row, beginning when he was in sixth grade. On his third attempt, Jonathan, still only 12 years old, won the Greater Philadelphia National Spelling Bee regional and advanced to the finals, to be held in the summer of 1971.


According the Howard-Scripps Newspapers, which sponsored the National Spelling Bee, there were more than 7.5 million spelling bee participants during the 1970-1971 school year. By June, the number was down to 77. Jonathan and his 76 opponents travelled to Washington for the two-day competition, which was set to begin on Wednesday, June 9th. Jonathan survived the first day. On the second day, the contest came down to Jonathan and Susan O'Malley, a 13-year old from Phoenix, Arizona. According to J.Y. Smith's story in the Washington Post, O'Malley stumbled over "gigot." Smith understatedly wrote that gigot was a word the

English language "has borrowed from the French, but not used much." Smith said that Webster's Unabridged Dictionary noted that "gigot" was pronounced "jigit" in English and "zheego" in French and was defined as "a leg (as of lamb or mutton) esp. when cooked." O'Mally spelled the word incorrectly as "jigot." Jonathan, however, still had to spell both gigot and a second word in order to win. He calmly spelled gigot and then "without hesitation" spelled correctly the word, "shalloon," which the St. Petersburg (Florida) Times noted was named after a French town and meant "the fabric of a coat lining."

Spelling, however, was not the only thing on Jonathan's mind while he was in Washington, D.C. According to Jonathan's later recollections:

National Spelling Bee contestants were taken on a tour of the White House and went through a receiving line where I met Pat Nixon. I asked her (because Richard Nixon claimed Quakerism) when the last time she and President Nixon had attended meeting for worship. She didn't answer the question, but talked about how they had attended many churches through the years.

The next day, after Jonathan won, he knew that his victory would be covered in many newspapers and was a moment during which he might be able to do something than merely promote correct spelling. "After having won," Jonathan recalled, "my father and I went over to the White House where Quakers were mounting a Vigil for Peace (protesting the war in Vietnam). I wanted to go and express solidarity and use my moment of fame to help promote peace." As Jonathan and his father, Samuel Knisely, hoped, the visit was indeed covered in national and local media. Smith's Washington Post story was particularly extensive:



Jonathan Peter Knisely is only 12 and it was only on Thursday that he won the 44th National Spelling Bee. So what did this laconic tow-head of an eighth-grader who likes to play baseball do next? Well, first he called on Sen. Clifford P. Case (R) of his home state of New Jersey ("He was really proud of me"). Then he joined the Quaker Peace Vigil on Pennsylvania Avenue in front of the White House. That was also on Thursday.

Yesterday, between a luncheon where he missed a chance to eat, and an appointment with photographers, he went back to the peace vigil.

"If the war isn't stopped, I might have to go to Vietnam if I can't become a CO," he explained. "I'm almost old enough to draft, and if the war doesn't end soon, I may have to go kill someone." Jonathan is a Quaker. As he spoke, he stood behind a sign that read: "We utterly deny all outward wars and strife.... for any end... Quaker Peace Testimony."

Asked if that accurately represented his views, the boy hesitated. "Well," he said, "I have to admit that I get into a couple of fights a week with my brothers and sisters."


But no, he added, he really is against war. Not just the war in Vietnam, but all wars.

Now that he is a spelling champion, it appears that Jonathan is expected to know about all manner of things.

One reporter even asked him to comment on President Nixon's statement yesterday that he would not compel rich suburbs to accept housing projects for the poor.

This was obviously a long way from Jonathan's particular area of expertise, so his father, Samuel, a glass blower who makes scientific instruments for an oil company, stepped in and said: "He really doesn't know anything about this. He's never been exposed to it. He goes to an integrated school."

That integrated school was, of course, the Friends School of Gloucester County (soon to be called Friends School Mullica Hill).

FSMH SPOTLIGHT: PAST HEADS OF SCHOOL

As part of the 2018-2019 Appreciation Dinner, we took time to honor the 160 trustees who have served the school since 1969 (representing 869 cumulative years of service!). I also had the pleasure of speaking about the ten women and men who preceded me as heads of school and to acknowledge the lasting contributions they made to the life of our school. The following is adapted from my remarks, with great appreciation for the research of resident historian and former clerk of the board, Bill Carrigan.

Mary Clare Wohlford (1969-1973) was first a teacher and then principal of Woodbury Friends School before overseeing the opening of the Mullica Hill campus in 1969 with 74 students and then the massive effort to move all of the students to this new location in the summer of 1970. Serving as head in the school's first year as a truly independent school, Mary Clare secured membership in the Friends Council on Education and gained official approval to award high school diplomas from the State of New Jersey. Mary Clare decided to "graduate" with the first high school graduating Class of 1973 and return to her home

state of Virginia where she and her husband became dairy goat farmers.

Ken Erdley (1973-1979) had the often difficult task of following the founding head of school. In his time, he oversaw the school-wide celebration of the Bicentennial in 1976, expanded school service projects and field trips, and introduced trips to Spain and France. Perhaps most memorable for those in attendance, Ken added an antique car show and performances by a Philadelphia string band to the Fall Festival.

Deborah Welsh Smith (1980) was a longtime trustee who served as acting head of school for several months before the arrival of Alex Horsely. She focused on injecting a "sense of play, humor, and lightness" into the school culture while seeking "creative order."

The highlight of Englishman Alex Horsley's tenure (1981-1985) was the construction of the Noel-Baker Building in 1982 which allowed for much greater involvement in sports. Enrollment increased from 193 students to 250 and attrition was cut in half. He also charged Hanshi Deshbandhu with creating a true middle school and instituted a senior trip to the Bahamas!

Alice Wisor was a longtime teacher who served as acting head of school when Alex Horsely left midyear to become founding head of the International School of Atlanta. She

helped provide steady leadership during the search for a new head.









John Brown (1985-1989) became the fourth head of school in the Spring of 1985. Despite being the second non-Quaker to hold the post (Ken Erdley was the first), he was key in improving the School's relationship to all of Salem Quarter and not just Woodbury and Mullica Hill Meetings. Under his watch, computers were added to the classrooms, field hockey became a sports option, and students traveled to Italy and Greece.

John Harkins (1989-2000), who we sadly lost earlier this year, has the distinction of serving the longest term as head of school. A longtime Quaker educator, his tenure included the acquisition of a neighboring residential property to house administrative offices. An even more significant event was the laying down of the upper school in 1992. The following year, the School received Middle States accreditation for the first time. Following completion of the first strategic plan, the School launched its first capital campaign and began building the Hanshi Deshbandhu Building.

Drew Smith (2000-2010), a longtime FSMH teacher, oversaw the completion of the Hanshi Building in 2002. Despite economic challenges of the decade, Drew stewarded the School's finances while increasing professionalisation of the board and faculty and maintaining the quality of the education. The School acquired key properties adjacent to the campus, including the Heritage Woodlands Preserve. Drew continues to serve Quaker education as Executive Director of the Friends Council on Education.



Bruce Haines (2010-2012), a lawyer by background, launched a new program for three-year-olds. He also increased the School's stewardship of the environment with the installation of solar panels, reducing the cost of electricity - a change that the School will continue to benefit from for years to come.



Beth Reaves (2013-2017) began at FSMH in Admissions and Development. She helped faculty revise the reading and writing curriculum and create a "one school one book program" that won a statewide award from the New Jersey Historical Commission in 2013. Beth oversaw the consolidation of the school into two buildings, leaving Salem behind, and initiated the return of international field trips with the addition of an 8th grade capstone field trip experience to Costa Rica.

Finally, she oversaw the Building Greatness campaign that led to enhancing indoor and outdoor learning spaces.



OPENING OF FSMH 25TH ANNIVERSARY TIME CAPSULE



On Friday, September 6, 2019, our entire school came together in the Mullica Hill meetinghouse to open the FSMH 25th Anniversary time capsule. The red metal suitcase that housed the time capsule traveled from India to the United States with Teacher Hanshi Deshbandhu and is thought to be circa 1900 in creation.

planner of much of the school's physical development, spoke of the procession of trucks that brought the Salem Building to its site, its installation, and its opening for class in a matter of


